## **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Curricular aspects of courses at Lady Irwin College are governed by University of Delhi Ordinances. Systems have been put in place in the college for transparent and effective implementation of the curriculum. The curriculum has been revised as per the university guidelines. This entails requisite changes in response to student and contextual needs with respect to various components of education such as infrastructure, teacher education, pedagogy as well as learning materials, books and students assessment. The curriculum has taken a trans-disciplinary approach and is based on human values, gender, equity issues, and ecological sustainability. The well-being of the community has been central in giving direction to the implementation as well including their concerns in curricular activities. The UG courses have been revised as per the LOCF/CBCS guidelines and is in place in the current academic session. All the content is developed as per the new guidelines and includes class transactions and evaluation guidelines to maintain parity and uniformity in teaching. For the effective transaction of the syllabus, the library is stocked with books as per the new syllabus. The already constituted coordination committees are respectively relooking into each paper and its transaction as per the LOCF guidelines. The post graduate curriculum was also revised as per CBCS/LOCF guidelines this year and is being implemented in the current academic year. The curriculum continues to keep in mind student preferences and includes new electives that accommodate societal and professional needs in accordance with industry trends and demands. The college organized Value Added Courses of 30 hrs that are beyond the curriculum and complement the skill sets of the students. UG and PG students also take up enriching internships in various organisations involved in development related activities, schools, communities, industries, hospitals, etc to provide for real-life experiences, much needed for professional success. As a learning organisation, we have always engaged in a continuous process of obtaining feedback from different stakeholders in a formal/ informal manner and has enriched the teaching learning processes. In recent years these have been standardised and regularised for all courses.

## 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

A staff council committee called Mentorship Committee is responsible for the mentoring system in the college. The committee had earlier allotted specific number of mentees to each teacher. This however did not meet with a favourable response from the students as they continued to approach teachers whom they were comfortable talking to. Hence it was decided that all teachers are mentors for students in Lady Irwin College and any student is free to approach any teacher she wants. This teacher need not be the teacher presently taking a course of the student. Each teacher shows slots for mentoring on her timetable. These are displayed on the student notice boards in each department. The teachers are also accessible on phone and email to answer gueries of students. Students mostly approach teachers for career advice, guidance on optional papers to choose, colleges suitable for higher studies in India and abroad, finance management for education as well as matters related to stress of coursework, inability to complete assignments on time and adjustment problems with peers. The faculty members have been sensitized to the mentoring process and to the kinds of stress/queries the students may approach them with. Career counselling is done by a staff council committee, the parents are also given career options and course orientation. In addition, there are two staff advisors to the Students' Association as well as 17 Advisors to the different Student Societies to provide mentorship to students for organizing extracurricular activities and inculcate leadership qualities. The Department of Development Communication and Extension of the college organised a Communication for Mental Health (C4MH) Campaign on 9th October 2018 in collaboration with an NGO Mind Specialists and The Richmond Fellowship Society (India) Delhi Branch, to sensitize students and faculty about discussing mental health issues. The programme included a talk by motivational speaker Sister BK Shivani, a street play and live wall painting. The Guests of Honour included Mr Najeeb Jung, Ex Lt. Governor of Delhi, Dr Nimesh Desai, Secretary State Mental Health Authority and Dr R. G. Anand, National Commission for Protection of Child Rights, Government of India.

2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college follows the broad guidelines given by the University of Delhi for conducting the Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE). Under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) 25 percent marks of theory papers and 50 percent marks of the practical papers are for internal assessment. For theory papers (maximum marks 100), 5 marks are for attendance, and there are two assignments of 10 marks each. These assignments can be in the form of tests, quizzes, presentations, etc. as decided by the teachers taking that course and as a Department policy for parity among different sections of students and teachers taking these courses. The evaluation is planned keeping course outcomes in mind. Every Department tries to bring innovation in the assignments given which foster creativity as well as motivate the student to learn beyond the textbook. For instance, for the course on Environmental Studies students were asked to visit field areas (like a protected area, any local ecosystem, polluted site) and prepare a short video as well as interview people visiting these places. Similarly, for the practical classes, the marking scheme for CIE is prepared and modality shared with the students to keep the system transparent.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Each Department in the college makes their calendar of major activities which is published in the college prospectus for the academic year as prior information for all students and faculty. The college strictly adheres to the academic calendar of the University of Delhi for the start and end dates of semesters as well as for the examinations. University of Delhi releases the tentative date sheet for theory exams in the beginning of the semester. The practical exam date sheet is prepared accordingly by the college so that all the practical exams are over one week before the theory exams. The calendar for other academic and cocurricular activities is also prepared. The Internal Assessment Committee releases dates for conduct of assessments/assignments and the submission of marks to the office. The Attendance Committee releases the last date for uploading monthly attendance of students. This ensures smooth and timely compilation of internal assessment of students leaving sufficient time for display of the marks and settling any grievances.

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

Student Association is actively involved in the admission of the new batch of students into the UG programme. The association assists the college UG admission committee. They are also involved with the orientation programme for the new batch of incoming students where the student activities and various societies are introduced to the freshers. The freshers talent contest is held by the different societies of the association to identify the talented newcomers and enroll them in various societies. #### CRITERION VI – GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

#### 6.1 - Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The College Time Table Committee is created in the staff council of the academic year. They meet in May and October for two semesters. The committee plans and looks into the issues related to time tables for students of B.Sc Home Science Honours and Pass and B. Tech in Food Technology, and space allocation for theory and practical classes. The composition of the committee is a senior teacher as Convenor and 5 other teachers one from each department of the college. Time tables of each semester created one month in advance, in May 2018 and December 2018 and are uploaded on website. Meetings were held regarding courses coming up in the semester, new courses, requirements of particular courses, venue availability and issues of time table in previous semesters. Each time the time table committee met formally a quorum of 4 members was adhered to. The comprehensive UG timetable was uploaded on the college website, sent to University and displayed on teacher and student notice boards. The PG time tables are decentralized, are made after UG timetables. Grievances and queries were addressed on immediate basis. The committee was available throughout the semesters to resolve time table issues faced by students and faculty. The College Section Committee: We offers bouquet of Discipline specific electives, Skill enhancement courses and Generic Electives. To efficiently counsel and allocate these various papers where students participate and take their options. section committee which comprises of one faculty member from each of the five departments and the sixth member is the

convener of the section committee whose is the overall incharge of the committee. The section committee has the formidable task of allocating Discipline Specific Electives(DSE), generic electives, and skill enhancement courses. The committee has in the past one year streamlined processes of counselling and optioning of elective papers by UG students. Notices are prominently displayed as well as sent on mICT, mgroups of students to inform them about the dates and venues for counseling and optioning. On the specified day the sections committee along with representatives from the departments offering the various papers provides an overview of the courses being offered and how the students will benefit by opting for the different papers. After which the students are asked to sign the optioning sheets indicating the choice they have made. Simultaneously the data is also fed into the computer. The whole process for each group now takes less than an hour as opposed to the past when computer entries were made later from the hard copies. For DSE papers a merit list has to be prepared based on the GPAs of the first three semesters. Additional faculty from each department was asked to facilitate the process this year so that both the pass and honours optioning could happen simultaneously. Last year the process was done over two days whereas this year the sections committee was able to complete the entire process in less than 3 hours allocating the DSEs for about 350 students.

Strategy Type	Details
Examination and Evaluation	There is an internal assessment which consists of two assignments (10 marks each). Internal assessment marks are entered in the INDOCON software before entering the internal assessment marks on the University of Delhi portal. The list is displayed on the notice board for at least three weeks prior to posting the marks on University of Delhi portal. Any redressal regarding correction is addressed (in consultation with concerned subject faculty member). After the marks are entered on University of Delhi portal, final assessment on submission of internal assessment is again ratified by the student for which they are requested to sign against their internal assessment for respective subjects in that semester.
Research and Development	We have a very vibrant research atmosphere. There is a duly constituted Institutional Ethics Committee (IEC) with 8 external experts (from the fields of medicine, law, social science, ethics, philosophy, and lay persons) and 7 faculty members that meets to accord approval for research 56 times in a year. Before projects go

through IEC, subject specific Technical Review Board critiques every proposal. All M.Sc dissertations (about 125), Ph.D. (about 15), and faculty research projects (5 to 6) go through ethics clearance. The fieldwork only begins after critical review and suggestions by the committee. Faculty Enrichment programs on research and ethics are regularly held to apprise members of latest developments in the field. To keep pace with modern technology and Library, ICT and Physical to automate the operations, library has Infrastructure / Instrumentation Library Management Software i.e. Libsys 10 on RHEL (Red Hat Enterprise Linux) Operating System which is upgraded from time to time. Last Upgradation was done in June 2019. To enhance their professional skills, library staff is deputed to attend computer training programmes organized by DULS. This provides hands on training for library operations in computerized environment. Library staff is also encouraged to participate in relevant conferences/workshops/seminars. To empower its users and to facilitate connectivity with literature published and electronically available in the field of Home Science and allied areas, library continues to provide access to various electronic databases via DULS. Lady Irwin College, as an institution Curriculum Development for higher learning, aims at preparing the students for the society at large. Over the past one year, the UG and PG curricula were revised as per the LOCF CBCS guidelines wherein, each programme vividly elaborates its nature and spells out the outcomes that are to be accomplished by studying the courses. The LOCF approach is envisioned to provide a focused, outcomebased syllabus with an agenda to structure the teachinglearning experiences in a more studentcentric manner. Spanned over a period of almost six months the process of revision went through step by step approvals by various stakeholders wherein feedback from experts, alumna, potential employers and exstudents were also obtained. The LOCF approach has been adopted to strengthen students' experiences as they engage themselves in the programme of their choice. The revised programmes

will prepare the students for both,

	academia and employability and international progression. The syllabus is at par the best universities in the world.
Teaching and Learning	Effective teaching requires creativity and innovation. Consequently, faculty is constantly engaged in reinventing teaching practices, using digital platforms like Google classroom for sharing study material, assignments with students. Teaching learning activities strive to promote active participation of students stimulating them to think and reflect instead of breeding passive learners. Innovative approaches like Twinning Program, pairing Lady Irwin students with.  American students for working in rural communities, encouraged crosscultural exchange inculcating diverse approaches to problem solving. Infusing real world experiences, through workshops, field trips, extension activities form an integral part of teaching learning pedagogy.
Human Resource Management	Every year, call for interviews are announced on the website for the Adhoc positions. Interviews are held and required faulty is hired. Orientation of the new faculty members is conducted in Staff Council and in respective departments. Every year several events are organised in the college, students, faculty along with nonteaching staff works in committees for smooth administration of these programs. Placement Cell for UG Students organises Job fair. In 2019, a total of 25 organizations participated in the job fair and 111 students appeared. Separate Grievance Committees are set up in college for staff as well as students. Every year on 1 January, the Director of the institute holds meeting with Laboratory staff to apprise changes in syllabi, job requirements, changing rules and discuss their concerns. Also meeting with the office staff is also held for the same. Retirement ceremony is organised for every faculty and nonteaching staff to recognise and appreciate their contributions in institute.
Admission of Students	Admission Committee is constituted to oversee the entire admission process. Central Admission Committee is headed by the Director, other members are two

senior and one junior faculty member, At least one of the faculty members belongs to SC/ST/Category so as to ensure social justice and for caste verification of students. One faculty member for PWD verification is included and from this year Nodal Officer of EWS also included in the Committee. Some of the steps undertaken to improve quality of admission were: • Extensive training of both faculty members involved in the admission was taken up to make everyone aware of the new admission norms, eligibility criterion for admission in various courses, method of calculating the percentage of candidates etc. • Further student volunteers from PG programs, Ph.D. scholars and students who are part of the student union were roped in and also trained to facilitate and to assist the faculty • For convenience of parents and students multiple signage were put up in the college arrangements were made at the admission venue, conducted in two large halls with waiting areas and place for students to sit and fill forms with the assistance of volunteers, arrangements were also made for parents accompanying their ward for sitting. • Computer and internet facilities, printing and photocopy facilities etc. were all made available • Laptops are provided in the admission hall to the volunteers also to verify the 12th marksheets of the students and also to verify the candidature on the Delhi University admission portal.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

We have placement cell in place. Job fair was organized on 2nd March, 2019. Nearly 25 organizations participated in the job fair, offering varying job profiles in the areas of nutrition, management, HR, fabric and apparel sciences, customer relationship management etc. The fair witnessed more than 300 walkins by youth from varied educational qualifications based on company profiles and positions. More than hundred registered and appeared for multiple positions. In addition to this, all PG departments have mandatory internships for students. It provides industry exposure to the students. Time to time, special lectures are organised where speakers from industry are invited. Apart from that, some students carry out their master's research work

where we promote advisors from industry.

Teaching As per the University of Delhi norms the following facilities are available to all permanent teaching staff. Medical Reimbursement, can avail health benefits and direct hospital payment facility and all provisions approved by University of Delhi/UGC. Faculty appointments prior to 2004 are eligible for pension benefits on retirement. Faculty after 2004 are covered under New Pension Scheme. GPF, gratuity and leave encashment are availed by retiring faculty as per University norms. Leave to teaching staff are given as per the guidelines of the University of Delhi and UGC. # 6.5.2 – Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association (at least three)

(Honours), Lady Irwin College, University of Delhi along with the faculty incharge - Dr. Swati Jain conducted a health talk for the support staff of Lady Irwin College as a part of POSHAN Pakhwada. About 20 support staff members participated in the talk. # 7.1.7 - Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

I. Sustainable Landscape and Organic Farming The college finds immense pride in the fact that it has been able to maintain the pristine state of nature in its campus. College has about 450 plant varieties and impetus is given for plants like Mangifera indica (Mango), Delonix regia (Gulmohar), Saraca asoca (Ashoka), Adansonia digitata (Baobab) and so on. There is a functional ecoclub that involves itself in various awareness programs regularly. The fallow land at the backyard of the college has been converted into a cultivable area for organic farming of seasonal vegetables. II. Energy Conservation College construction allows for natural ventilation and lighting throughout its campus which helps conserve the energy demand. Energy efficient lighting fixtures like T5, CFLs and LEDs are used in all classrooms and departments. Students are encouraged to submit assignments online and wherever possible, ecirculars are used for communication. III. Use of Renewable Energy Energy efficient fixtures like solar lamps, solar street lights, LED street lights, LED head lights, solar water heaters and solar panels are installed throughout the college campus. Lady Irwin College plans to expand the use of solar energy all over the campus through solar rooftop scheme of Ministry of New Renewable Energy. IV. Waste Management Waste is properly segregated at the college level and indiscriminate use of chemicals is discouraged during classes. The college has recycled all

the computers and its components in the last 25 years and follows the practice of buy back policy of lithium batteries and ink cartridges. It has awarded the tender to Government approved vendor for managing ewaste as per safety norms. For paper waste management, the college has tied up with "Jaagruti - Waste Paper Recycling Services" for converting all used paper into useful products like notepads for use by college staff and students. In April 2019, the College in collaboration with IPCA installed Aerobins near the hostel mess of the college for managing kitchen and garden waste. Waste is converted into manure using Rolypoly, Briquette equipment and Vermicomposting. Leaf composting is done inhouse and sold in months of excessive leaf fall in order to clean the pits. V. Water Management Large green area of the college campus allows for percolation of water into the soil thereby facilitating recharging of underground water reserves. Rain water harvesting is also being practiced in the building. The college has also replaced regular water fixtures with water efficient fixtures. VI. Researches on Ecofriendly Innovations and Awareness Generation Initiatives All departments of the college have been actively involved in conducting researches on ecofriendly innovations in the area of solar energy, water conservation, waste management, etc. The College has organised numerous workshops and trainings to addres diverse issues for sustainable development. Constitution of Task Force has been a best practice since 2007 as it focuses on adding rigor into the curriculum through annual review by National and International academic leaders, Government policy makers, Master NGOs and practitioners. Goal The primary objective is to harmonize the academic input and resulting output with a view to bring education and skill at par with the industry. It brings to the table a range of skills ideas to constantly upgrade the curriculum in the light of new opportunities. The ideas are deliberated upon for highlighting the research thrusts for Masters and PhD researches. The Context The task force members are from diverse professional backgrounds including academic, government, nongovernment, corporates and international organizations, who are actively involved with the department as advisors, mentors and guides for various innovative projects, researches, short term courses and other academic activities. They have been instrumental in synergizing theoretical transactions with practical exposure and in providing experiential and enriching learning experiences to students through internships and job placements. The Practice The exemplary nature of the practice has been validated by its success over the past twelve years. The department reviews its teaching, research, extension, placement and internships with experts like ViceChancellors (or their nominee) of National and International academia, industry CEOs, Master NGOs, Government officials and international academicians. The task force is chaired by International and National experts of eminence. For the same, college has been networking and collaborating with various governmental and nongovernmental organizations of national and international repute in various capacities. The College lays emphasis on state of the art education, research and extension by nurturing innovation,

leadership and national development. Building capacities on Sustainable
Development through sponsored Annual Symposium: The College strives at
addressing a critical gap in sustainable development education, which is in
line with future demand and industry requirements. Towards this effort, the
Department of Resource Management Design Application, Lady Irwin College, in
collaboration with School of Planning, Design and Construction, Michigan State

University, USA has been organizing its prestigious annual symposium on Sustainable Development for more than a decade, with sponsorship from MNRE, Government of India and EESL, a JV of PSUs under Ministry of Power. RAK Child Study Centre: The college hosts Rajkumari Amrit Kaur Child Study Centre in its 6th decade. It is one of the oldest, pioneering centres to study growing Indian child which encourages many international visitors, Fulbright senior fellows.

Dr. Kalam Computer Centre: It was initiated to organize courses for marginalized and disadvantaged women groups so that they could be empowered in ICT skills. Centre of Women Collectives led Social Action (ROSHNI): Department of Development Communication and Extension has established a technical support unit of National Rural Livelihood Mission financially and technically supported by UNICEF, India. The Centre has entered in an MoU with Ministry of Rural Development, GoI. This centre has been serving as technical support unit to DAYNRLM for knowledge management, policy and convening support for food, nutrition, health, family planning, gender transformative work and WASH interventions with and for women self help groups and their federation network under DAYNRLM. National Centre of Excellence and Advanced Research on Diets: The centre, established in 2018 within the Department of Food and Nutrition at

Lady Irwin College, New Delhi with support from UNICEF, is a technical assistance resource centre to the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, GoI on research and policy formulation for women's nutrition. Furthermore, NCEARD has signed MoU with IIPS and IEG and has initiated a joint UNICEF Indian Institute of Technology, Bombay Fellowship programme. Over the past one year significant progress has been made in the centre like release of Janani Shishu Suraksha Karyakram diet norms guidelines, Jan Andolan (Poshan Maah) activities under Anemia Mukt Bharat and development and ongoing pilot testing of draft maternal nutrition guidelines and tool kit for field workers, counselling material, CAPI based tool on CSPro, Monitoring checklist and Frequently Asked Questions with the objective of integrating maternal nutrition into routine antenatal care. The college as well as faculty have earned several awards and distinctions, including National Poshan Maah award of MoWCD in 2018. They are recognized in their areas and are invited as experts and resource persons in every part of the country.
