1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

In accordance with the University of Delhi guidelines, the curriculum is periodically revised by the Department of Home Science, of which Lady Irwin College is a part. The last revision, aligned with the learning-outcome-based framework (LOCF), has been implemented from the academic sessions 2019-20 onwards. LOCF is structured so as to provide teaching-learning experiences that are more student-centric. The curriculum was revitalized with comprehensive learning areas that integrate science, social science, and technology. It incorporates contemporary concepts drawn from current research and theoretical frameworks, both global and national. In order to equip students with abilities that are future-ready, there is an emphasis on providing them experiences in a wide variety of institutional as well as work settings. There is an emphasis on writing as well as oral presentations, skills in using digital technology, and teamwork, along with many opportunities to exercise thinking skills, creativity, and problem-solving. In keeping with a widening range of exposure, the curriculum also provides students with more subject choices as well as components of experiential learning so that students acquire knowledge and skills based on field exposure outside of the typical classroom. This includes community work, visits to various organizations, participation in conferences and seminars, and student research and internships. In addition to learning activities about the various areas of the curriculum during the fieldwork, the students are prepared to be part of the workforce. The internship opportunities are in various organizations involved in development-related activities, schools, communities, industries, hospitals, and research organizations. Apart from the opportunities to learn about the development and its related practices, many of these settings also help students develop greater empathy with the marginalized and the communities they work with. The well-being of the community has been central in giving direction to the implementation as well including their concerns in curricular activities. The curriculum takes a transdisciplinary approach across five disciplines of Home Science and is based on human values, gender, equity issues, ecological sustainability. The postgraduate curriculum keeps in mind student preferences and includes new electives that accommodate societal and professional needs in accordance with industry trends and demands. These studies enable students to go further in these directions towards a holistic understanding while also undertaking more rigorous inquiry and initiating them on the path of research in their areas of interest. Ethical considerations, effective use of research methodologies and analysis, and technical writing are some of the key abilities that students develop during these two years. The objectives of learning are naturally and

deeply connected with the manner in which they are learned. Hence, pedagogical considerations occupy an important place in curriculum enhancement processes. This is enriched not only by our own experiences and theoretical insights but also through a continuous process of obtaining feedback from different stakeholders. This is done both formally and informally and has helped us refine the teaching-learning processes over time. In recent years these have been standardized and regularised for all courses.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

The feedback is obtained from various stakeholders - namely students, alumni, parents, faculty and employers. Questionnaires were used to collect feedback. Data were collected and analysed terms of frequency of responses in each option and represented in the form of tables and graphs. Separate reports on feedback from the five stakeholder groups were prepared and shared with Academic Committee for review. Further, these reports were shared with Department Incharges of all the departments. Each department held meetings where the report was shared with different faculty members. On the basis of the feedback, discussions were held to improve the existing teaching-learning strategies and their implementation Initiatives have been undertaken to encourage alumni to join Lady Irwin College Alumnae Association (LICAA) in large numbers and take active part in association activities. In the feedback alumni stated that they could contribute to and serve valuable role in a range of activities. These included involvement in collaborative research through projects, placement/ recruitment, bringing in networking opportunities, as resource persons for trainings, provide internship opportunities, support curriculum design, provide financial assistance/ scholarships, be part of alumni meets, and also in mentoring. A few of the association members have contributed towards establishment of new scholarships for the students. Several alumni have given constant support in terms of research, internships, mentoring students and being resource persons in workshops and trainings being organised in various departments. Based on the Employer feedback, special focus is being given on building research-based skills in students both at UG as well as PG level. Planning of time management workshops and training for students was also carried out. As per Parents' feedback, admitting their wards to the college was a matter of pride for them (90). Majority of them appreciated college discipline, regularity in conduct of classes and the conducive learning

environment at Lady Irwin. It was noted that some parents were not aware of the features of college website like attendance or notice updates. Thus, students were asked to inform their parents about these features. Also, at various levels, whenever interactions with parents were feasible (especially on Founders' Day), they were informed about the college website, its key features and other achievements of the college. Some parents have given neutral feedback on the hostel facility. Hostel committee has been provided the feedback to further look into the matter and make suitable changes. Further, faculty members were advised to take up subject related field activities in the practical classes to make the learning more experiential as per the feedback. Faculty feedback has helped faculty members as well as college administration to re-examine the existing system and plan for improvement. Faculty members felt that they must give more attention to research and publications, establishing good relationship in industry which can help improve the quality of education, provide better exposure to students and improve their prospects for employment. Most of the infrastructure of college has been rated good or excellent, but further up-gradation of existing ICT facilities would be carried out by ICT committee.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The Mentorship Committee is a Staff Council Committee of the college. Students can approach any teacher for mentorship. Our experience has shown that students wish to approach different faculty members for different issues like career counseling, discussing curriculum related or personal difficulties. All teachers are hence mentors to students who approach them. They are accessible physically in college, for which they indicate mentoring slots on their timetable. In addition, they are available on WhatsApp, email and phone. In addition, career counseling as well as counseling for selection of elective papers was done in sessions conducted by the Sections Committee. During Orientation programs for first year Undergraduate and Postgraduate Students, the students are counseled about career opportunities and how to make the best of college life by alumni and senior faculty. Two Staff Advisors and 17 Student Society Advisors are available for guiding and mentoring students. An event called 'Chatathon 1.0' was organised on 22nd October 2019 in the front lawns of Lady Irwin College by faculty and students of Lady Irwin College in association with Dr Sujatha Sharma (a leading clinical psychologist in Delhi) and supported by Mind Specialists (RAHAT Charitable Trust). More than hundred and twenty college students, faculty, NGO representatives, counsellors and people from the general public attended the discussion on common mental health concerns. The participants were involved in a game session using Mansik Swasthya Varnmala developed Dr Aparna Khanna, Associate Professor, DCE Department to initiate the conversation on mental health concerns. Participants' mental health concerns were addressed by mental health experts present at the event. The concept of Chatathon 1.0 was highly appreciated by all the participants. Dr Renu Malaviya, Disability Mental Health Professional and Associate Professor, Department of Education, Lady Irwin College, was on the University Mental Health Counseling Team which helped several students in distress during the pandemic. At the college level specific student queries regarding their experiences of stress, anxiety, depression, etc. were addressed during the year by Dr Renu Malaviya, Dr Pooja Raizada and Dr Aparna Khanna while maintaining full confidentiality. Besides, general guidance and counselling, students in need of specialized care were referred to government hospitals for further advise. Online meetings with students and parents were also organized to address issues regarding online curriculum transaction and exams.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college follows guidelines of the University of Delhi for conducting Continuous Internal Evaluation, under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). In view of Covid-19, revised guidelines issued by the University were followed. University of Delhi follows the pattern of 25 percent marks of theory papers and 50 percent marks of the practical papers graded as internal assessment. In the even semester, as per University of Delhi guidelines for theory papers, instead of earlier three components of internal assessment viz. class tests, assignments and attendance, only one component i. e. internal assignment was conducted using online tools. The assignments were given to students in prescribed format via e-mail/ Google classroom and solved assignments were received by teachers via e-mail/ Google classrooms as per scheduled timelines. Internal assessment for practical papers was done in Continuous Evaluation mode as earlier. Teachers were sensitive to the hardships the students were facing during the lockdown period. Laptops were issued to needy students. Relevant resources were provided to all students to prepare them for assessments. Online strategies used were found to be effective, student friendly and to the

satisfaction of students and faculty. The marking scheme and modality for continuous internal evaluation was shared with the students to keep transparency in the system. Although the covid pandemic created many challenges but with suitable iteration the continuous internal evaluation was possible and a satisfying experience.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The Calendar for major activities of the college was published in the college prospectus. The major activities and events planned by each Department were listed in the same for the benefit of all students and faculty. The college strictly followed the academic calendar of the University of Delhi for the start and end dates of semesters as well as for the examinations. The timetables were made by a central committee based on the academic calendar. During the lockdown period, the University had to change the academic calendar. Examination modalities as well as dates were changed. Open book exams (OBE) were held online only for final year students after 30 June 2020. New modalities and timelines for completion of classes and internal assessment were also announced. The college diligently adhered to the new timelines. The Internal Assessment Committee ensured that all assessments were completed on time and marks were duly uploaded on the University portal.

Lady Irwin College has a very organized and democratically elected Student Association. It enhances the overall educational experiences of students through development of, exposure to, organization and participation in social, cultural, multicultural, intellectual, recreational, traditional and community service programs. The Students' Association comprises a Central Coordinating Executive and 13 societies that enrich the cultural and corporate life of the college. Student Association organizes various events throughout the year, which broaden the scope of education besides providing students a platform to show-case their talents and learn managerial and organizational competencies. The Societies take care of the cultural activities while the central union has members who offer logistics support and ensure that the student activities are carried out smoothly. 6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

Decentralization Participative Management The Lady Irwin College, University of

every individual gets an opportunity to evolve and grow. Two such exercise that followed the ethos of decentralization and participative management are the revision of UG syllabi of Home Science and Food Technology in 2019 under the Learnings Outcome based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) and SPV installation at the college (218 kWp). 1. LOCF Curriculum Revision The LOCF curriculum revision followed a robust approach under the able guidance of the Director of the college. A complete decentralized methodology was followed giving ample freedom to the faculty members to participate across the various departments of Home Science. A core working group, a writer team, who were representing the five departments of Home Science was formed. Series of micro internal meetings were held, followed by macro meetings at the Department Level. Once the instructions were laid out small faculty groups started working in their nano teams. For each paper, a coordinator was deputed, along with three other working members. Constructive modifications in the syllabus were made through round table meetings within the 5 departments of Home Science. Meetings with Academic Council and Executive Council were also held. Papers were then collated by one coordinator and uploaded on the portal. Suggestions and modifications received were updated regularly on the portal. Only the coordinator incorporated all required changes so that there was no confusion and overlaps. The implementation of LOCF was effective in harnessing decentralized processes and small group tactics among various smaller subject teams that came up, consequent of the LOCF assignment. This exercise undeniably encouraged participation from all stakeholders, part of the continuum of the Home Science Curriculum. 2. SPV installation at Lady Irwin College (218 kWp) The SPV committee has been working on roof top solar installation on Lady Irwin College since the year 2016-2017. To take this mission forward, the committee contacted various vendors and invited quotations from them for SPV installation. A number of meetings were held with the vendor wherein three rooftops were found to be feasible for SPV installation. It is really an honour for the college to have taken the sustainable agenda of the government forward by generating solar energy and reducing the carbon footprint of the city and nation as a whole. In this endeavour the college provided an extremely enabling environment to the Convenors and members of the SPV committee in taking important decisions and taking the project forward. Meeting with vendors, decisions about approval of vendor and taking the project forward was complete responsibility of the team. Dr. Anupa Siddhu, Director, Lady Irwin College was the guiding force and her encouragement, forethought and motivation gave the SPV team courage to take bold decisions and execute the project. The SPV project was successfully installed within a span of five months from June 2020 to October 2020. The SPV plant was inaugurated by Hon'ble Chief Minister, NCT of Delhi, Shri Arvind Kejriwal on 14th October'2020.

Apart from online internships, and research studies, students developed new methodologies and tools to enhance virtual outreach to the community. In order to promote digital learning, PG students developed

Students were trained in designing virtual exhibitions and melas using ICT applications. Students designed a virtual Yuva Shakti Mela 2020 as part of the Each One Enable One initiative.

The Central Admission Committee was headed by the Director, two senior members and two junior faculty members, SC/ST/OBC Observer, EWS and PWD nodal officers. A special email-id was created to handle admissions related correspondence. Committee members were given access to the Delhi University admission portal for accessing student data, marksheets and certificates. Students' queries, grievances received on director's email and admission committee's email were processed on urgent basis.

Students joined internships leading to job placements at institutions such as AIIMS, National Heart Institute, St. John's Research Institute and organizations like HCL Healthcare, among others. Students also joined the Ph.D. program across Departments. Grievance Committee addresses issues of staff and students every year. The College Director addressed concerns of laboratory and office staff and familiarized them with new rules. Retirement ceremonies, both online and offline were organised for faculty and nonteaching staff to honour their contributions to the institution.
Teaching and Learning	The faculty, with great innovation and an adaptive-to-context approach has been deeply engaged in reinventing teaching practices, using digital platforms like Google classroom for live teaching, sharing study material, assignments and conducting tests, with students. Teaching learning activities

	strove to promote active participation of students stimulating them to think and reflect on issues of contemporary global, cultural and national relevance. The students have engaged with research using new online methodologies, and have greatly benefitted from their experiences. Infusing real world experiences, through online workshops, online internships and extension activities form an integral part of teaching learning pedagogy.
Curriculum Development	The revised UG and PG curricula as per the LOCF CBCS guidelines, has been put into operation. Teaching is conducted according to pre-drawn weekwise teaching plans, keeping in view the objectives and learning outcomes of each course. The LOCF approach is envisioned to provide focused, outcomebased learning, with a schema to structure teaching-learning experiences in a student-centric manner. The revised syllabi has an astute assessment of field based needs as in its development feedback from various stakeholders, experts, alumna, potential employers and ex-students was obtained. The revised programmes prepare the students for both academia and employability, and international progression.
Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation	The College takes pride in a richly stocked fully automated reader friendly library. The Library Management Software, Libsys 10 on RHEL (Red Hat Enterprise Linux) Operating System is upgraded regularly. Library staff is regularly deputed to attend computer training programmes and webinars organized by DULS, and other relevant conferences, trainings and workshops. To empower users and facilitate connectivity with literature published in the field of Home Science and allied areas, the library provides access to various electronic databases via DULS. The library staff undertakes plagiarism checks for faculty and students before submission of publications, seminar reports and masters dissertations.
Research and Development	The College follows global standards in research and development, with systematic safeguards in place for ethical research practice. Subject specific Technical Review Boards (TRB)

	scrutinize each proposal. All M.Sc. dissertations (about 125), Ph.D. (about 15), and faculty research projects (5 to 6) go through ethics clearance. The Institutional Ethics Committee (IEC) with 8 external experts (from the fields of medicine, law, social science, ethics, philosophy, and lay persons) and 7 faculty members, meets more than 50 times a year. Fieldwork begins after critical review and suggestions by the committee. Faculty Enrichment programs on research and ethics are regularly organized.
Examination and Evaluation	End semester internal assessment of undergraduate and postgraduate students is conducted in the format of an online Assignment Test of 25 marks. The test is uploaded on the online classroom and students complete and submit within a stipulated period of time, in accordance with the OBE (Open Book Examination) pattern. Internal assessment marks are entered in the INDOCON software. The list is displayed on the college website as well. Correction of marks requests are looked into by the faculty members. In the parent-teacher meeting, all EOC students along with their parents were contacted on one-to-one basis online. They were asked to bring into notice the problems (if any) they are facing in the online mode of teaching. After taking the issues from students, teachers teaching the EOC students were approached, concerns of students were shared with them, their views were collected and then EOC Convenor requested the faculty members to give additional support to the students enrolled under PwD category (2019-2020) either with phone or other modes.

Design Application Department integrates varied design projects (major minor) ranging from sustainability in design (adopting circular approach to design process to ensure delayed disposal and protect the environment), social design (adopting participatory design process with local communities as co-designers living in rural / urban slums) to customized designs for specific purpose (individual / institutional / commercial) or employing renewable energy resources to prototype solar engineered products. This endeavour excelled via celebration of Annual National Innovation Day and provided opportunity and motivated students across educational institutions, to innovate and think differently while designing and prototyping products for environment and social relevance. Such an initiative was nationally recognized and college was granted a Design Innovation Center (A SPOKE of DIC, University of Delhi) by MHRD under National Initiative for Design Innovation. Teaching Learning Reforms As an effective policy for classroom teaching, submission of assignments, class projects, dissertation, conducting Open Book Examinations, etc., Lady Irwin College has endeared to incorporate Information Communication Technology (ICT). Students were given mock drills to understand the process for downloading question paper from the Delhi University Portal and later Upload scanned answer scripts back on the portal. The mock trainings were helpful in seamless conduct of Semester-end examinations, paper corrections and release of results so that final year UG students could take admissions in higher education courses offered not only by University of Delhi but also other universities across the country. Empowering Persons with Disabilities (PwD) Every student at Lady Irwin College is special and is provided with adequate infrastructure facilities to enable effective teaching learning process and maintain their motivation level to learn. College keeps close interaction with PwD students (through Equal Opportunity Cell) to identify their accessibility to the classrooms, laboratories, wash rooms and common areas. As per the felt need by PwD students, ramps were constructed for laboratories, classrooms, including appropriate furniture / counters for conducting practical classes. Special care was taken to provide independent access to laboratories and classrooms particularly for wheelchair bound students. Each learning block has toilets for physically challenged students wherein there are handrails, wide doors and adequate space to enable moving around in the wheelchair.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

Initiative I: Landscaping with trees and plants Situated at the hub of the city and declared as a heritage structure, the college finds immense pride in the fact that it has been able to maintain the pristine state of nature in its campus. The natural landscape pre-dominates the campus with a rich biodiversity of flora and fauna which is taken care of by a dedicated team of workers. College has about 450 plants, which are adequate based on the acreage of the college campus. Impetus is given for plants like Mangifera indica (Mango), Syzygium cumini (Jamun), Citrus limon (Lemon), Delonix regia (Gulmohar), Magnolia champaca (Champa), Azadirachta indica (Neem), Saraca asoca (Ashoka), Adansonia digitata (Baobab), Eucalyptus globulus (Eucalyptus), Manilkara zapota (Chikoo), Morus (Mulberry) and many more. A continuous monitoring of the biodiversity is carried out by students, teaching and non-teaching staff. The college also has a Gardening Committee comprising of botanists who are engaged in maintaining the eco-friendly environment. There is a functional and active eco-club that involves itself in various awareness programs, seminars and other events at regular intervals. Van Mahotsav is celebrated every year to spread the concept of sustainable development and the importance of environment management and conservation. Practice of giving out and planting pots saplings as souvenirs at various college events is also followed. The Science (Botany) department of the college has been fundamental in converting the fallow land at the backyard of the college into a cultivable area which is used in organic farming of seasonal vegetables. Herbal gardens are maintained and medicinal plants like Aloe Vera, Ashwagandha and Tulsi are also grown. The inputs to the land are the wild varieties of seeds, bio-fertilizers and bio-pesticides. This

helps in maintaining the land quality and providing organic vegetables to the teachers, staff students at the same time.

Initiative II: Energy Water Management LPG use and fossil fuels have been long disposed in the college. The college has a network of IGL lines in over 32 laboratories and 50 residential units on campus. Commercial IGL connection has been provided to canteen and hostel as well. Use of Renewable Energy To promote use of renewable energy, energy efficient fixtures like solar lamps, solar street lights solar water heaters are installed throughout the college campus. Solar water heating systems were installed in the UG hostel in 2006 and in New PG Block in 2014. • Solar Photovoltaic (SPV) System Initiative (218 kWp) The SPV committee of Lady Irwin College has been working on roof top solar installation since the year 2016-2017. This was in line with the long standing history and commitment of the college to be sustainable in use of resources. For the same, IPGCL was contacted and PPAs were signed with Oakridge Energy Pvt. Ltd., one of the empanelled vendors of IPGCL on March 5, 2020 for installation and commissioning of the project under RESCO model. The solar plant is expected to generate about 3 lakh units of power each year and will lead to substantial savings for the college by reducing energy bills. It was inaugurated in October 2020 by Delhi Chief Minister and widely covered by media. Energy Conservation College construction allows for natural ventilation and lighting throughout its campus which helps conserve the energy demand. Long slender and clerestory windows in library, nearly eliminates the need for artificial lighting. Energy efficient lighting fixtures like T5, CFLs and LEDs are used in all classrooms and departments. Hi speed internet Wi-fi facility and OPAC facility are available in the college. Further, students are encouraged to submit assignments online and wherever possible, e-circulars are used for communication in all departments. Water Conservation Management Large green area of the college campus allows for percolation of water into the soil thereby facilitating recharging of underground water reserves. College only uses non-potable water for maintaining its gardens and farms. Rain water harvesting is also being practiced in the campus. To promote effective conservation of water, the college has replaced regular water fixtures with water efficient fixtures like dual flush and low flow systems. Conscious efforts are made by the garden committee to use new plant varieties requiring less water to further this initiative.

Initiative III: Waste Management SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT Paper waste: The College has tied up with "Jaagruti - Waste Paper Recycling Services" for managing its paper waste. All the used paper of college is sent to them for recycling into useful products like notepads for use by college staff and students. This initiative marks Lady Irwin College as a zero paper waste institution. Innovation project on paper recycling was also instituted wherein students made useful items like notepads, covers and other products. Plastic Waste: Use of plastic in any form is discouraged in the college campus and efforts are taken by all departments to reduce and reuse plastic waste. Students of department of Resource Management Design Application conceptualize and develop lifestyle products using plastic waste. Department of Education develops teaching-learning materials such as science kits and educational games for Special Needs children from plastic waste. Kitchen and Garden waste: In April 2019, Lady Irwin College in collaboration with Indian Pollution Control Association (IPCA) took an initiative to install Aerobins in the campus. Aerobins have revolutionized the system of home and garden waste management. They use a patented lung or aeration core inside a sealed bin to promote aerobic break down of organic matter releasing nutrients into the soil. Presently, aerobins are installed near new PG Block of the college. Other than this, the kitchen and garden waste is also managed by converting it into manure using Roly-poly and Vermicomposting. This manure is used in maintaining the campus's exquisite landscape as well as organic farming. Leaf composting is

done in-house which is also put on sale in months of excessive leaf fall in order to clean the pits. Due to COVID, the above systems have been relatively inactive since March 2020. LIQUID WASTE MANAGEMENT College only uses nonpotable water for maintaining its gardens and farms. The hostel mess has installed grease traps to collect and reduce the amount of fats, oils and grease that enter the main sewers. This is an effective means of grease removal on site to prevent drain blockages, foul odors and potential pest infestation. E-WASTE MANAGEMENT The Computer Resource Centre of the college/purchase committee followed the practice of buy back policy of lithium batteries and ink cartridges while making new purchases. This practice was discontinued with the introduction of GeM portal. It has awarded the tender/auction to government approved vendor for management and disposal e-waste as per safety norms. HAZARDOUS CHEMICALS MANAGEMENT The waste material in college is segregated into biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes, and as toxic and non-toxic wastes in the laboratories. Indiscriminate use of chemicals is discouraged during practical classes. The college does not use radioactive substances in their laboratories.

Initiative IV: Capacity Building for Green Future Being aware about one's environment fosters a sense of responsibility towards it. It also promotes sustainable development and encourages conservation of all resources. Keeping this in mind, Lady Irwin College organizes numerous webinars, campaigns, workshops, symposiums, projects, rallies and trainings to address diverse issues of the environment. These activities are conducted within and beyond the campus to create awareness among the students and develop a better understanding of environmental issues and concerns. Best Practice I: Constitution of Taskforce in Department of Resource Management and Design Application Lady Irwin College is committed to build opportunities for students through extensive networking. Constitution of Task Force has been a best practice since 2007 as it focuses on adding rigor into the curriculum through annual review by National and International academic leaders, Government policy makers, Master NGO's and practitioners. Goal The primary objective of taskforce is to harmonize the academic input and the resulting output with a view to bring education and skill at par with the industry. It brings to the table a range of skills and ideas to constantly upgrade the curriculum in the light of new opportunities. Foreseeing potential hurdles in academic endeavours and recommending feasible solutions for the same form an important goal. The Context The departments of the college offer specialization in diverse areas wherein each area focuses on developing community specific core competencies in the students. The task force members are from diverse professional backgrounds working in domains related to the five specializations within Home Science. The members have been actively involved with the college as advisors, mentors and guides for various innovative projects, masters' and doctoral researches, starting short term courses and other academic activities of the departments. The Practice The department reviews its teaching, research, extension, placement and internships with experts like Vice-Chancellors (or their nominee) of National and International academia, CEOs of industry, Master NGOs, Government officials supporting grants and initiatives and international academicians. The task force is chaired by International and National experts of eminence. The sessions focus on comprehensive discussions circling around review of curriculum in the light of new growth opportunities, challenges in the industry specific skill requirement. They also provide post graduate students with opportunities through various internship programs and job placements and hold advanced interdisciplinary workshops. During the taskforce meets, post graduate students also have their research poster presentations as a parallel activity. The 13th Annual Task Force Meet of the department was held in February' 2020. Evidence of success The taskforce committee has played an instrumental role in developing a holistic framework for curriculum up gradation and community networking through the following activities: Upgrading curriculum: When the semester system mode was instituted in the Master's Program of the college, a paper on Project Management was introduced for first year post-graduate students and was taught using software "Primavera" in order to inculcate specialized skills in the students. Furthermore, students have been given an understanding of other softwares like SPSS, AutoCAD, Rhinoceros, Dialux to name a few in order to refine their technical skills. The department

 symposium has been funded by the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy (MNRE)
 and Energy Efficiency Services Limited (EESL), Government of India since its

inception in 2008. The focus is to address different aspects of environment and sustainability like green buildings, renewable energy and energy efficiency. The Department convened its 13th Annual Symposium on "Harnessing green energy for the future" in February' 2020 at Lady Irwin College. First South Asian Conference on Sustainability is a recent initiative organised by Prem Jain Memorial Trust and Michigan State University, USA along with other core partners School of Planning Architecture New Delhi, Lady Irwin College-University of Delhi, IDH-the Sustainable Trade Initiative and Ella Pad Foundation, Dhaka, Bangladesh.. The conference was held on 3rd March, 2020 at C.D. Deshmukh Auditorium, India International Centre, New Delhi. The main objective of the conference was to address the concerns of Textile and Apparel Industry. The Department of Fabric and Apparel Science holds a seminar in the memory of Mrs. Sanjam Randhawa, the founder faculty member of the Department of Fabric and Apparel Science. The Sanjam Randhawa Memorial Seminar is a one day event for the students of the Department. Every year, a theme related to various aspects of textiles is taken up and eminent resource persons in those areas are invited like Dr. M. L. Gulrajani, Dr. M.S. Parmar, Ms. Shveta Gujral. The Department of Human Development and Childhood Studies hosts Biennial Alumni Lectures in the Department. The main feature of this event is to initiate student faculty-alumnae academic interaction to reflect on the department's role in contributing to human development with special cognizance to human rights. To commemorate 50 years of the department, a round table discussion was held on 10th February, 2020 with the Alumnae of the 70's as the panellists whose inspiring stories helped carve the path ahead for the Department. The Department of Education holds National Conference on Learning annually on various contemporary issues related to education and hold a vision to view 'Learning' from the perspectives of different stakeholders and identifying elements for success in 'Learning'. A two-day conference was organized on December 6 and 7, 2019 on the theme "Teachers: Effecting Change for a Sustainable Future" sponsored by National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE), a statutory body of the Government of India. It deliberated on the learnings from the journey of Teacher education, the changing trends for the future and how teachers can continue to make a difference in the generations to come. Evidence of success The Lectures have consistently been delivered by the eminent persons in their fields. In addition to these, national and international scholars have been hosted by the departments for exchange of ideas and methods of research.

Lady Irwin College persistently aims at achieving excellence and growth by focusing on the development of professional skills and empowering women. For achieving these objectives, college consistently focuses on collaborating and networking with many national and international organizations working in the government, non-government and corporate sector in various capacities. This mostly includes partnering with Government Ministries and agencies like NITIAayog, MNRE, Ministry of Health, FSSAI, WCD, Department of Education for Mid-day meal, DST and so on. The college maintains its state of the art education, research and extension, capacity building by fostering growth, innovation, leadership and national development. Centre of Women Collectives led Social Action (ROSHNI): In Lady Irwin College, there is a technical support unit of National Rural Livelihood Mission financially and technically supported

by UNICEF, India established by Department of Development Communication and Extension. It is popularly known as ROSHNI Centre. College has entered in an MoU with Ministry of Rural Development, GoI. The focus of this centre revolves around Knowledge creation, Capacity building for scaling-up, Learning and relearning in Swabhimaan programme and policy guidance to NRLM and the centre has conducted numerous activities to this end. National Centre of Excellence and Advanced Research on Diets (NCEARD): In Lady Irwin College, NCEARD centre was established by Department of Food and Nutrition in the year 2018. UNICEF provided start-up support to it. This is serving as a technical assistance resource centre to the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India on research and policy formulation for women's nutrition. It has partnered with National and State governments and various other reputed organizations like International Institute For Population Studies (IIPS), Medical colleges (Lady Hardinge Medical College and associated Kalawati Saran Children's Hospital and Lal Bahadur Shastri Hospital), National Centre of Excellence and Advanced Research on Anemia Control, UNICEF, Alive and Thrive, Nutrition International, National Institute of Nutrition, Yenepoya Medical College and Institute of Economic Growth (IEG). Also, this centre has signed Memorandum of Understanding with IIPS and IEG and has initiated a joint UNICEF-Indian Institute of Technology, Bombay Fellowship programme. Numerous activities like trainings, consultations, workshops and orientations are conducted as part of this initiative.
