About the Prospectus

This prospectus is for young women interested in applying for the Graduate, Postgraduate, Postgraduate Diploma and Ph.D. programmes of study at Lady Irwin College and the programmes of study at Lady Irwin College. The Prospectus provides information about the College and the programmes that are offered, life at Lady Irwin College, student and academic support services, fee and financial information. It also informs you about the procedure for admissions, The other sections contain information about the departments, courses, faculty, as well as more detailed descriptions of the Undergraduate, Masters and Postgraduate Diploma programmes. We make every effort to ensure that programmes and courses are offered as described here and that any subsequent changes would add to, rather than detract from, your opportunities. However, certain circumstances may occasionally make this impossible, and we reserve the right to alter or withdraw particular programmes or courses. The information in the prospectus is also subject to revision under the University of Delhi guidelines for students from time to time with respect to admission/withdrawal, internal assessment and reservation policy.

General Information

It is mandatory for each student to adhere to rules and norms as notified in circulars from the University of Delhi or the College. Every student is required to sign a declaration at the time of her admission that she will comply with the disciplinary jurisdiction of the College/University Authorities during her studies. The declaration is given in the admission form. Ragging is prohibited and anyone indulging in the same will be considered as having committed a breach of discipline. Action will be taken against those found guilty as per the Supreme Court Directive (Refer to Ordinance XV-C; Prohibition and Punishment for Ragging). Students of the college are advised to refer to the College notice board and website on which relevant information is uploaded periodically. There is a monitoring committee which includes student representatives. The Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) has a statutory status and is empowered to carry out the mandate of the policy on sexual harassment. Any complaint can be given to any member of the committee, which will take cognizance of complaints, conduct enquires, provide assistance and redressal to the victim, recommend penalties and take action as prescribed by the University of Delhi rules .

Health

There is a Medical Help Desk in the college comprising a committee of college faculty and students as members. The College has a Medical Room with a medical attendant. It caters to the first-aid needs of the students. It is open from 8:40 am to 4:30 pm on all working days. In case of an emergency, under supervision students are sent out for professional medical treatment provided at a Government hospital and guardians/parents are informed.

Lady Irwin College spreads over 16.5 acres with red brick buildings amidst sweeping lawns and resplendent trees in the heart of New Delhi. Courts for tennis, badminton, basketball, volleyball and areas for athletics are part of the College campus. In the green surroundings stands the students' hostel which houses about 200 students. The Director, Hostel warden and several teachers also live on the campus

The College is situated in the cultural centre of Delhi. Art galleries, museums, exhibition grounds, theatre, music and dance facilities are accessible within a radius of a kilometre. The local Mandi House Metro Station is an important hub, and the college is connected to all other parts of the city by the Delhi Metro. The College has highly qualified teaching faculty, many of whom have received national and international recognition for their teaching, research and publications. The teachers also serve as advisors and resource persons for important governmental and voluntary agencies, as well as for universities all over the country and abroad. Teachers are also invited to lead research projects in their areas of specialization for institutions like UGC, ICSSR, DST, ECI, government departments, national and international Universities and agencies.

The College has well-equipped laboratories and classrooms and a library with about 45,000 books and periodicals. On the campus, the College has programmes for the care and education of young children as well as children with disability. These programmes also function as a laboratory pre-school and childcare centre, and are an adjunct of the Department of Human Development and Childhood Studies. The College has a long tradition of service to the community. Wherever possible, the focus is on the needs of the less privileged and on developmental programmes to assist them. Community work is also carried out under the National Service Scheme, with special emphasis on adult literacy. The College has been recognized for excellence in work related to Communication and Extension. Lady Irwin College was one of the UGC recognized Centres of Advanced Studies (2012). Doctoral studies have been conducted in such diverse areas such as ICTs and new media development, programme evaluation and communication research, functional literacy, entrepreneurship development, management of resources, landscape designing, nutritional assessment, computer aided counselling, energy expenditure, new product development

1. Bachelor of Education

The eligibility requirements for the B.Ed. Programme are as follows:

Candidates must fulfil both Part A and Part B of the eligibility conditions.

A. Minimum Qualifying Marks*

- Candidates with at least 50% mark in aggregate either in Bachelor's Degree (B.Sc. / B.H.Sc.) or Master's Degree (M.Sc. / M.H.Sc.), are eligible for admission to the programme. * [as per Appendix-4 of the NCTE (Recognition Norms and Procedure) Regulations, 2014 - notified in the Gazette of India

B. Eligibility for Subject Category and Teaching Subject

- All candidates will be offered Science as Pedagogy 1 option and Home Science as Pedagogy 2 option as teaching subjects.
- The candidate must have studied in the qualifying degree, i.e., Bachelor's Degree (B.Sc. / B.H.Sc.) or Master's Degree (M.Sc. / M.H.Sc.) for at least 200 marks or at least 12 credits (as per UGC guidelines related to CBCS courses) in Core Course and Elective Courses.
- A candidate with a degree of Home Science with B.A. / M.A. programme will not be eligible to apply for the B.Ed. programme.

2. B.Ed. Special Education (Intellectual Disability)

Candidates must fulfill both Part A and Part B of the eligibility conditions.

A. Eligibility Conditions for B.Ed. Special Education (Intellectual Disability) Programme*

Candidates with at least 50% either in Bachelor's Degree and/or in the Master's Degree in Science/Social Science/Humanities/Commerce/ Bachelor's in Engineering or Technology with specialization in Science and Mathematics with 55% marks or any other qualification equivalent thereto, are eligible for admission to the Programme.

(* as per the NCTE Norms and Regulations, 2014-notified in Gazette of India and RCI norms 2015)

AND

B. Eligibility for Choosing the Teaching Subject

The candidate will have to choose only one subject (within a subject category) from Table 1 which she must have studied in the qualifying degree i.e., Bachelor's Degree or Master's Degree for at least 200 marks and obtained at least 50% in this subject. This subject will

henceforth be referred to as the teaching subject in the B.Ed. Special Education (ID) Programme. Candidates are advised to carefully study the table 1 given below, showing the subjects offered in the various subject categories.

Relaxations and Concessions:

1. The minimum eligibility requirement for the Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe candidates will be that they must have passed the qualifying school/degree examination. Provided that the minimum eligibility for admission to postgraduate Courses be the minimum pass marks of the qualifying examination concerned of the University of Delhi. In the case of Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe candidates who had passed the last qualifying examination from other Universities, they should have secured at least the same percentage of pass marks at the qualifying examination as prescribed for the equivalent examination of Delhi University for purposes of admission to the Postgraduate course of this University.
2. 4. M.Sc. Programmes

Attendance

According to the rules of the University of Delhi, students must have the required attendance both in Theory and Practical separately of each subject in order to appear in the End Semester exams. To qualify the semester examinations, students must maintain a minimum attendance of 67% in each subject as per rules of University of Delhi.

Medical certificate with reference to attendance

In the instance of absence from classes due to medical reasons, the medical certificate of illness for the calculation of attendance should be submitted within a week of joining after illness, and should be accompanied with a doctor's fitness certificate. In no case will a medical certificate be taken into consideration for calculation of attendance after the attendance for that semester has been finalized.

The original medical certificate must be submitted within the stipulated one week period to the office of the Vice Principal. The stamped certificate must then be shown to the concerned subject teachers for signatures and noting in their attendance register. Medical certificates submitted after the one-week deadline will not be accepted or considered valid.



DEPARTMENT OF FOOD & NUTRITION AND FOOD TECHNOLOGY

The Department of Food and Nutrition, established since 1958, was the first Postgraduate Department of Lady Irwin College. It offers M.Sc. in Food and Nutrition in three areas of specialization, namely, Clinical Nutrition, Public Health Nutrition, and Food Science and Processing and a one-year Post-Graduate Diploma in Dietetics and Public Health Nutrition (PGDDPHN) with a 3-month internship in the Dietetics Department of a hospital. The master's program is also strengthened by a 4–6-week summer placement in different hospitals, NGOs, research institutes and the food industry. In addition, the Department offers a Ph.D. program in all three areas of specialization. B.Sc. (Hons) Food Technology course was started in Lady Irwin College in July 2017.

The excellent academic program of the Department is enriched by the laboratory experience, as well as community outreach activities, supported by easy access to well-equipped laboratories, Department library, computers, and other necessary facilities. The different courses have been expanded and diversified to meet the emerging needs and challenges in the field of Nutrition and Food Technology. This has been achieved through not only course work but with emphasis given to research, community work focusing on capacity building of underprivileged sections of the population, seminars, internship/training in hospitals, food industries, and related organizations, educational tours, conferences, and workshops.

Lady Irwin College is an empaneled training partner under the Food Safety Training and Certification (FoSTaC) initiative of FSSAI since 30th June 2017. Faculty members are certified trainers and assessors and more than 300 trainees have undergone the Food Safety Supervisor – basic/advanced catering and manufacturing certification courses. The Department is also recognized as the "National Centre of Excellence and Advanced Research on Diets" since 2018. Department of Food & Nutrition and Food Technology has been recognized as the State Level Technical Institution (SLTI) for Delhi Government under the Pradhan Mantri Formalization of Micro Food Processing Enterprise (PMFME) Flagship Scheme by the Ministry of Food Processing Industries, GoI in 2020. A grant has been received from the Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science and Technology under the Star College Scheme to strengthen Education and Training for the BSc (Hons) Food Technology Program in 2020.

DEPARTMENT OF DEVELOPMENT COMMUNICATION & EXTENSION

The Department of Development Communication & Extension was founded in 1964 under the Ministry of Food and Agriculture, Government of India, initially known as the Rural Community Extension. The course underwent restructuring after the adoption of the nomenclature "Development Communication and Extension" (DCE) in 2007. The Department specializes in educating students on social and behavioural change communication, refining their understanding of communication strategies, and equipping them with the skills to develop effective media and methodologies for facilitating such changes. One of the cornerstones of the department is its robust extension programme. The curriculum is designed to build theoretical and conceptual

understanding along with practical skills in participatory methods and techniques. Students are oriented to various social issues, techniques of advocacy & capacity building and skill development of different stakeholder groups. Over the years, the Department has evolved into a multi-faceted experiential learning hub, providing students with holistic training to address diverse issues of different communities. Students receive comprehensive field exposure through concurrent fieldwork in both urban and rural communities, and six weeks internships within development organizations, government departments, and corporate organisations. The Department collaborates with various agencies to facilitate its extension and outreach activities.







DEPARTMENT OF SCIENCE

The Department of Science strive for transacting basic science theory and activities encompassing the systematic study of the structure and behaviour of the physical and natural world through observation and experiment.

The Science Department of Lady Irwin College has its roots in the initiation of the B.Sc. Home Science degree programme in the year 1950. The Science Department is comprising highly qualified faculties from various disciplines: Botany, Biomedical Sciences, Chemistry, Environmental Sciences, Horticulture, Molecular Biology, Physics, Zoology, etc. The Science Department has an interdisciplinary approach and is committed to inculcate rational thinking, inculcate scientific temper and decision making among undergraduate students through basic and practical teaching in the streams of Botany, Chemistry, Physics and Zoology. The curriculum of the subjects trains students in the laws of natural science through supportive practical experiments and field visits. Our students come from various educational backgrounds, and many of them do not have adequate initial training in science. So this curriculum helps create a level playing field for everyone by the time they are ready to pass out and join their professional duties. After completing their undergraduate programs, students can pursue postgraduates in food and nutrition, human development and childhood studies, Fabric and apparel science, development communication and extension and resource management and design application. In all these courses, the background of science training helps them excel.

Science courses also help students develop research skills in science to conduct research at the Masters and Ph.D. level. Many students opt for B.Ed and B.Ed Special Education after completing their undergraduate programs. Having a strong science base at the

undergraduate level, students are able to efficiently teach science to school students after completing their Bachelor of Education. Science courses provide skills and build capacity for students to become leaders in their professional lives. The Department of Science is committed to conducting research-based activities for the benefit of students and the entire academia. The activities involve interdisciplinary research covering various dimensions from all the core subjects like botany, chemistry, physics, zoology and environmental science. The faculty is guiding students working in various areas of research such as study of physicochemical properties of honey, vitamin-C analysis, etc. under the DBT STAR programme. Other areas of research include studies on birds, urban ecosystems and food habitat sustainability, long term population dynamics of water bird communities and climate change, macro fauna diversity in agricultural soils for sustainable production of food, availability of food commodities through urban agricultural practices, impact of polluted Yamuna water on agricultural practices followed by the farming community. Faculty members have also worked on molecular docking and MD simulations of various drug molecules on various viruses. They have been involved in introducing students to scientific writing for research journals and encouraging them to write research papers.



The department organizes various academic activities like lectures, tree planting, environmental conservation activities, field visits, eco-club activities, quiz etc. and make the students aware about eco-friendly farming and organic food. The curriculum of the department has been changing from time to time keeping in mind the needs of the students of today's world. The department organizes annual debate competition in memory of Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam to promote scientific and environmental thinking among the youth. The department also organizes invited lectures on National Science Day. Several webinars/invited talks/workshops of eminent scientists working in various fields of science are also organized by the department to make the students aware of the ongoing scientific research in various fields. The department offers value added courses (Science and Society), skill enhancement courses and GE papers in Zoology, Botany, Physics, Chemistry and Environmental Science. The department has constituted Science Journal Club under the visionary guidance of our former Director Prof. Anupa Siddhu. The science Journal club prepares the students to have analytical thinking, be observant, have a rational approach, value and acknowledge the importance of our nature and natural resources.





Lady Irwin College Library provides an updated facility of books, journals and online support to undergraduate and postgraduate students, faculty and research scholars. The library is housed in a separate building constructed in 1958, which has a one and a half storey structure. In 2009–10, the library building was renovated with latest ICT requirements while retaining the ambience of its heritage structure and making it energy efficient. Today, the Lady Irwin College Library is fully automated with all its subsystems and equipped with 120 seating capacity, Air-Conditioned Conference Hall, Fiber Optic 24x7 connectivity, Wifi enabled building, internet work station with 34 computers. Founded in the 1930's with a few gifted books, the library has grown significantly, with 58154+ published documents and hundreds of electronic documents. The library subscribes to more than a hundred national and international journals every year. It has 3297 research works (Dissertations, Thesis and Reports) and more than 7800+ bound back files of periodicals. The college library is known for its quality collection among Home Scientists nationally and internationally. Major areas of

its collection are: Food and Nutrition, Food Technology, Development Communication and Extension, Resource Management and Design Application, Human Development and Childhood Studies, Fabric and Apparel Science, Dietetics, Education and Special Education. Other areas include Food Science, Sociology, Psychology, Anthropology, Children with Special Needs, Gender Studies, Women Studies, Apparel Design, Fashion Designing, Applied Science, Communication, Management, etc. It has been a constant endeavour to keep pace with modern technology. The library has become digitalized by automating its services and access to literature and data provisions (printed and digital), its collection and in providing network services. For the LAN, the library uses LIBSYS 10 – library management software on cloud i.e. OPAC is available 24x7 from any internet enabled device. The database of library holdings (books and journals both) is available on OPAC on library LAN for bibliographical searches. To have error free circulation, library uses bar code technology for its documents and Library ID card, and scanners. The library offers the following services: Lending services,

OPAC facilities (Online Public Access Catalogue), OPAC on INTERNET also through DELNET, Reference Services; Bibliographical Services, Plagiarism check facility, Fiber Optic connectivity for INTERNET surfing, Wifi, Online search facilities of E- journals and Databases subscribed by DU, E SHODHSINDHU viz. EBSCO; SCOPUS; J-STORE; Springer, Elsevier, Blackwell, Taylor & Francis and others in public domain. DELNET (Developing Library Network) connectivity and Search through CD- ROM Digital Databases: ISID, Plan and Statistical Database; Reprographic facilities (on contractual basis) are also available. In addition, E- journals and E-books access is available remotely through N-List as well as DULS. Library is a member of GOI Initiative ONE-NATION-ONE SUBSCRIPTION (ONOS) Library Orientation sessions for UG and PG students and webinars for research scholars and faculty are organized from time to time to keep them updated. Library is equipped with KIBO device to facilitate text translation, audiotization and digitization of printed/handwritten material.




Computer Resource Centre

The main hostel, Hilla Faridoonji Hall, was inaugurated in 1934 and PG Hostel was inaugurated by Mrs. Hilla Rustomji Faridoonji, President of All India Women's Education Fund Association (AIWEFA) in 1954. The main Hostel houses undergraduates and PG Hostel accommodates largely post-graduate students and Ph.D. scholars.

The sprawling lush green lawns in front of the buildings add splendor to the architectural beauty of the red brick buildings. The eye-catching serpentine staircase and spacious galleries in front of rooms characterize the main hostel building. The interiors and layouts of the rooms in the two buildings are in harmony with nature and ensure sunlight and free circulation of air. The students are free to jog and walk the lush green campus. They avidly use the basketball court for jogging, play, group activities, and study sessions.

The hostel is Wi-Fi enabled and has a fully air-conditioned all-purpose common room, 'Travancore'- the television and entertainment room with LCD facility which plays the role of a party room during festivals and occasions and a study room during examinations.





Aptly named "**Cherish Canteen**" as the acronym of 'Choose Healthy-Eat Right-Inspire (Others)-Stay Healthy', this facility endeavors to extend, through its operations, the responsibility of encouraging healthy eating. It provides safe, economical, diverse, fresh and healthy snacks, lunch, and beverage options during college hours, to satisfy the appetite of students and staff members of the college, from diverse cultures.
